# TITLE: THE CHALLENGES OF INTERCULTURALITY AND INTERDISCIPLINARITY FOR A PHILOSOPHY OF CULTURE

### Abstract:

Ernst Cassirer's philosophy of culture is no arid academic exercise. To the contrary, in his own work Cassirer has demonstrated how his philosophical approach could be fruitful for other disciplines that investigate special areas of culture. He also took into consideration intercultural aspects, as in investigating to what extent different cultures develop similar symbolic forms, or to what extent certain cultural forms are unique. This session will investigate the special challenges both interdisciplinarity and interculturality can pose for an open philosophy of culture as conceived by Cassirer. We have organized two panels, one with invited speakers, the second open for those wishing to participate. Speakers responding to the Call for Papers (below) need not be Cassirer experts, but should address the challenges to a philosophy of culture by interculturality and interdisciplinarity. Submissions are welcome especially from areas outside of "core" philosophical disciplines.
